¿Puede el mundo del arte, con sus razones estéticas universales, declararse al margen de las reglas del régimen patriarcal? ¿Está este campo libre de techos de cristal, mansplaining y estereotipos de género? Nada de eso parece corroborarse cuando se atiende a los números del sistema oficial: las mujeres tienen menos premios, menor presencia en las exhibiciones y ocupan, salvo excepciones, lugares subordinados en las historias del arte. Frente a este escenario, un intenso movimiento de transformación está en marcha. De la mano del activismo feminista y de género, a partir de los años setenta del siglo pasado el arte ofreció herramientas para un imaginario liberador y puso al cuerpo femenino como lugar de expresión privilegiado de una subjetividad en disidencia. Feminismo y arte latinoamericano presenta un

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panorama teórico y cuantitativo de la escena femenina en las artes visuales y se detiene en la intervención de artistas que contribuyeron a construir una imaginación emancipadora en América Latina. Andrea Giunta recorre en estas páginas la emergencia de nuevos temas [la maternidad, el acoso, la prostitución, los cuerpos divergentes] y nuevas formas de representación, que interpelan no sólo las diferencias entre un arte feminista y un arte femenino, sino también las relaciones de poder inscriptas en los modos de ver y mostrar. Este libro cuenta la historia de una revolución en curso y en ella se propone como una intervención activa desde el conocimiento. Si todavía hoy el universo del arte replica, bajo las formas de la exclusión y la invisibilización, las distintas violencias contra las mujeres, restituir el sentido político del feminismo artístico no significa reponer un conjunto de nombres en un sistema de poder, sino contribuir a la apertura de una comprensión distinta del mundo.

This book by one of Latin America's leading cultural theorists examines the place of the subject and the role of biographical and autobiographical genres in contemporary culture. Arfuch argues that the on-going proliferation of private and intimate stories [what she calls the [biographical space]] can be seen as symptomatic of the impersonalizing dynamics of contemporary times. Autobiographical genres, however, harbour an intersubjective dimension. The [I] who speaks wants to be heard by another, and the other who listens discovers in autobiography possible points of identification. Autobiographical genres, including those that

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border on fiction, therefore become spaces in which the singularity of experience opens onto the collective and its historicity in ways that allow us to reflect on the ethical, political, and aesthetic dimensions not only of self-representation but also of life itself. Opening up debate through juxtaposition and dialogue, Arfuch's own poetic writing moves freely from the Holocaust to Argentina's last dictatorship and its traumatic memories, and then to the troubled borderlands between Mexico and the United States to show how artists rescue shards of memory that would otherwise be relegated to the dustbin of history. In so doing, she makes us see not only how challenging it is to represent past traumas and violence but also how vitally necessary it is to do so as a political strategy for combating the tides of forgetting and for finding ways of being in common.

In this important book, one of Latin America's foremost critical theorists examines the use and abuse of memory in the wake of the social and political trauma of Pinochet's Chile. Focusing on the period 1990–2015, Nelly Richard denounces the politics and aesthetics of forgetting that have underpinned both the protracted transition out of dictatorship and the denial of justice to its survivors and victims. What are the perils and social costs of a culture of forgetting? What forms do memories of injustice take in newly formed democracies? How might a history of violence and an ethics of reparation be reconciled in post-autocratic societies? In addressing these and other questions, Richard exposes the abuses of the past and the present while also attending to the residues of memory that are manifested in street protests, literature, and the media, and in artistic practices from architecture and urban design to installation and film. While cultural artifacts can be powerful devices for resistance and critique, Richard argues that they can also be complicit in reproducing and collaborating with forms of institutional and political oblivion. Both within Chile and beyond, Richard offers a trenchant critique of how authoritarian regimes and neoliberal states whittle away at memory's critical capacity. At a time of seismic political realignments in Latin America and internationally, *Eruptions of Memory*

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makes a powerful case for the ethical, political, and aesthetic value of memory.

From today's vantage point it can be denied that the confidence in the abilities of globalism, mobility, and cosmopolitanism to illuminate cultural signification processes of our time has been severely shaken. In the face of this crisis, a key concept of this globalizing optimism as World Literature has been for the past twenty years necessarily is in the need of a comprehensive revision. *World Literature, Cosmopolitanism, Globality: Beyond, Against, Post, Otherwise* offers a wide range of contributions approaching the blind spots of the globally oriented Humanities for phenomena that in one way or another have gone beyond the discourses, aesthetics, and political positions of liberal cosmopolitanism and neoliberal globalization. Departing basically (but not exclusively) from different examples of Latin American literatures and cultures in globalized contexts, this volume provides innovative insights into critical readings of World Literature and its related conceptualizations. A timely book that embraces highly innovative perspectives, it will be a mustread for all scholars involved in the field of the global dimensions of literature.

Dematerialization examines the intertwined experimental practices and critical discourses of art and industrial design in Argentina, Mexico, and Chile in the 1960s and 1970s. Provocative in nature, this book investigates the way that artists, critics, and designers considered the relationship between the crisis of the modernist concept of artistic medium and the radical social transformation brought about by the accelerated capitalist development of the preceding decades. Beginning with Oscar Masotta's sui generis definition of the term, Karen Benezra

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proposes dematerialization as a concept that allows us to see how disputes over the materiality of the art and design object functioned in order to address questions concerning the role of appearance, myth, and ideology in the dynamic logic structuring social relations in contemporary discussions of aesthetics, artistic collectivism, and industrial design. Dematerialization brings new insights to the fields of contemporary art history, critical theory, and Latin American cultural studies.

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
